Dear Secretary Noem and Director Edlow:

We write to express our grave concern and strong opposition to the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services' (USCIS) December 2, 2025 announcement indefinitely pausing the adjudication of all immigration applications for nationals from the 19 countries named in President Trump's discriminatory travel ban. Across the country, green card applications, naturalization interviews, and even oath ceremonies are being paused or cancelled, solely on the basis of the applicants' national origin. Despite the Trump Administration's claims of going after the "worst of the worst," it is attacking the very people who have followed every process and undergone extensive and repeated vetting to secure legal status. This sweeping action is unjustified, discriminatory, and inconsistent with our nation's founding principles. We demand that you lift this pause immediately.

This indefinite pause is already causing significant harm. Immigrants are reportedly being notified that interviews and decisions have been halted presumably for no reason other than their country of origin.² For those applying for green cards, they are choosing to seek permanent residency and embark on the financial commitment and years-long path to apply for citizenship. And for those approved for naturalization, they have successfully followed every rule to become a U.S. citizen. In some cases, individuals who have fully passed the citizenship exam were pulled out of line by USCIS officers' moments before their oath ceremonies.³

These naturalization ceremonies are a time of celebration, as soon-to-be U.S. citizens welcome their friends and family to witness their achievement of becoming a U.S. citizen. To deny this monumental achievement to those who have waited years, if not decades, to pledge the Oath of Allegiance, delaying their naturalization through no fault of their own, is a slap in the face to all those who have devoted their time and energy to become U.S. citizens. It is also a waste of USCIS resources, such as employees who adjudicated applications, which includes vetting and screening, throughout the process.

It has become clear that this administration is threatening our country's longstanding legal immigration and citizenship pathways. Many of the people now being blocked have lived in the United States for years, contributing to their communities and undergoing extensive and

repeated vetting by DHS. Many have been screened multiple times throughout the immigration process. To suggest categorically, without any individual review of the case, that these same long-time residents suddenly pose a serious threat, defies both logic and the government's own record.

The Trump Administration has been quick to issue this broad, sweeping policy change but characteristically slow to clarify how long this pause will last, or whether this change will be permanent. Initial guidance USCIS issued has not presented any details of additional vetting that is needed or that should be conducted. The callous decision to halt these immigrant applications is reprehensible and the effects will be devastating for immigrants and citizens alike. Without clarity on how long this broad pause will last, soon-to-be citizens will be left in limbo for perpetuity and families will be forced to remain separated. What is clear is that no amount of vetting, moral-character, or commitment to this country and its democratic values is enough to satiate the Trump Administration. We oppose the Trump Administration's actions and urge you to lift this pause immediately.

Given the far-reaching consequences of these impacts, we seek transparency on this decision and request a response to the following questions by December 31, 2025:

- 1. How many individuals have had their citizenship ceremonies canceled since the policy change was announced in a USCIS memo on December 2, 2025?
 - a. Provide a breakdown by country of individuals impacted.
- 2. How many individuals and applications do USCIS believe are impacted by this pause?
 - a. Provide a breakdown by country of individuals impacted.
 - b. How many adjustments of status (green card) interviews and decisions have been canceled or halted? Provide a breakdown by country of individuals impacted.
- 3. According to the USCIS memo, Director Edlow will be responsible for determining when this broad pause on immigration applications is lifted.
 - a. How long will USCIS maintain this pause and does the agency have a timeline for when the pause will be lifted?
 - b. What is the status of the comprehensive review of the agency's security and vetting policies?
 - c. Provide details about the particular background and security checks that the Administration believes are deficient, or believes were implemented deficiently, which have prompted this pause.
 - d. Are any new background and security checks being run on the impacted cases that were not run previously new or additional systems, for example?
 - e. Please provide this information in a report to Congress and post it publicly on the USCIS website.
- 4. The USCIS memo also requires a thorough re-review process for all applicants from the 19 countries under President Trump's travel ban.

- a. What are the factors being considered in this re-review process?
- b. How is this pause impacting USCIS staff workload?
- c. What resources are being reallocated to conduct this review?
- d. What steps is USCIS taking to ensure that the re-review process of these applications will not result in delays for the processing of other benefits requests?
- e. Does USCIS anticipate adjudicating all of the family and employment-based preference slots available in Fiscal Year 2026?
- 5. Will the pause or cancellation affect the prospects of individuals' ability to naturalize?
 - a. What has USCIS done to reassure individuals that their eligibility for naturalization is still valid, and that this is a temporary hold?
 - b. When will impacted applicants be informed of their ability to continue their naturalization interview or oath of citizenship at a later date?
 - c. If an individual falls out of status due to this pause, can USCIS confirm that a Notice to Appear will not be issued and no enforcement action will be taken?




